



Dr. Rachel Thibeault O.C. receives honorary Doctor of Science

First UBC Honorary Doctorate to an Occupational Therapist. The conferring of Doctor of Science, honoris causa on Dr. Rachel Thibeault on November 27th, 2015 coincides with the UBC Centenary celebrations.

Dr. Thibeault is well known in Canada as an occupational therapist, professor, and community developer, and internationally as an activist for health, well-being and social justice in the global community. Her impressive career of international service is grounded in the founding principles of client-centred occupational therapy, collaboration, respect for human dignity, and the power of occupation to improve health and meaningful participation. Her community-based programs and research in Africa, Asia, and South America are particularly noteworthy as she has co-created small businesses with local youth and adults affected by war and conflict, disease, and disability by introducing novel microcredit programs and using client-centered values to help establish sustainable employment. In Laos, Lebanon, Nicaragua, Zambia, Ethiopia and Sierra Leone she focused on skill development and vocational training programs for girls and women. While advocating for these communities she has helped Canadian occupational therapists recognize the links between social justice and meaningful occupations. She is both a pioneer and advocate for community development and eloquently shares with others ways to restore and sustain social enterprise to promote

Not surprisingly, Dr. Thibeault has received numerous awards in recognition of her achievements. In 2001 she was awarded the Muriel Driver Lectureship, the highest award given by the Canadian Association of Occupational Therapists. Her teaching excellence has also been recognized with several awards in 2002, 2003, 2005, 2007 and 2008. Most notably, in 2013 Rachel Thibeault was named an Officer of the Order of Canada, for “expanding the boundaries of occupational therapy and advocating for persons with disabilities,” with the following citation extracted from the Order of Canada Archives:

Rachel Thibeault has empowered marginalized people around the world. An occupational therapist and professor at the University of Ottawa, she has developed rehabilitation and social integration programs for landmine survivors, war-affected children, and people living with HIV/AIDS and leprosy. She shares her experiences as a speaker, inspiring a generation of occupational therapists and other professionals to expand their practice beyond traditional boundaries.

During her 3-day visit at UBC, Dr. Thibeault met with Dr. Gavin Stuart, the Vice-Provost Health, and numerous faculty and students. She gave a public lecture to the UBC community titled “Going against the flow: Low-cost, accessible strategies for building resilience” (<https://www.youtube.com/watch?v=NuoSQ1Gw6Kg>) where she profiled her research on resilience drawing from the fields of psychology, neuroscience and occupational therapy, and explored low-cost, accessible and user-friendly strategies for resilience and well-being. Her visit included a reception for honorary degree recipients and special guests hosted by UBC Chancellor, Lindsey Gordon.

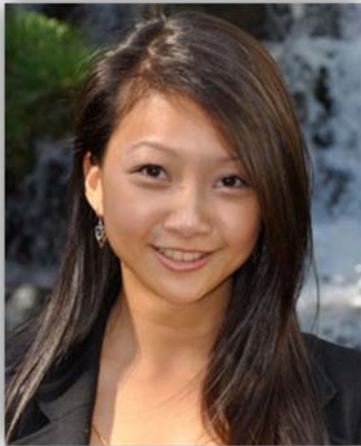

I went skydiving in Hawaii the summer before starting my program and it was absolutely amazing.

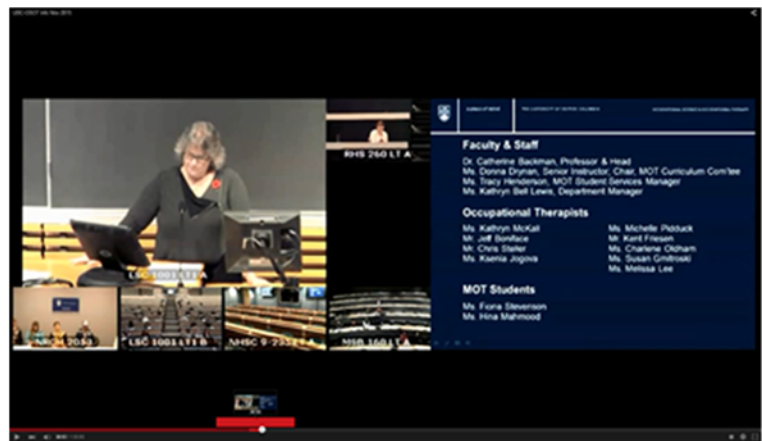

Recently, we have been recruiting for two new Assistant Professors, one to begin in July 2016 and the other to begin in July 2017. I want to thank **Sarabjeet Charchun**, from Fraser Health, for representing the clinical faculty on the Search Committee, and **Laura Bulk**, PhD student, and **Hina Mahmood**, MOT student, for representing student interests. **Melinda Suto** and **Liisa Holsti** served as academic faculty representatives.

As you'll read elsewhere in the newsletter, occupational therapy made a big splash at the Friday morning ceremony at the University's November Congregation with the conferral of MOT, MRSc, MSc, and PhD degrees, and an honorary doctorate to Dr. **Rachel Thibeault**. UBC student contributions to build this remarkable facility make students the largest donor to the University's start an evolution campaign, which concluded this fall after raising over \$1.6 billion to invest in learning and research.

You were part of the impressive figure. In our 2015 annual fundraising campaign, faculty pledged to match donations to the Department up to \$7500 – and you outpaced us, pledging \$7600! That's over \$15000 that we raised to support student bursaries and awards for our students, the annual Capstone Conference, and the OSOT research initiatives fund. I am grateful to all those who contributed.

Thank you. There are a limited number of bursaries for which MOT students are eligible, and students are very appreciative of financial support. Likewise, it takes time to develop research, and our research initiative fund helps launch new ideas. Last spring, thanks to a contribution from Clinical Professor Emeritus Ginny Fearing, matched by the OSOT research initiative fund, our first grants were awarded (see summer newsletter) and with your support, 2016 will be year two and establish a tradition of scholarship.

This fall we've been happy to support CAOT-BC's public awareness campaign and share the benefits of occupational therapy to promoting health, occupation, and quality of life. This includes participating in a public forum in Kelowna, meeting with politicians, and supporting CAOT-BC members in their local advocacy efforts. As the demand for occupational therapy grows we want to be ready to meet it with well-educated, enthusiastic graduates ready to serve the people of the province. Do you have gaps in your knowledge and skills are limiting your ability to provide optimal client services?

Consider reviewing UBC's online course offerings on Rehabilitation Sciences. UBC's online graduate courses are designed to fill such gaps and are directly relevant to practice. They can be completed at home, and at a time of day that fits your schedule. If one course is what you need, **taking just one course is an option** if you meet academic requirements for admission.

One area which practitioners often feel they have less skill is assessing the evidence on **measurement tools** and selecting appropriate tools for assessing clients, predicting who can benefit most from OT and for measuring outcomes. [RHSC 505, Measurement for Assessment, Planning and Evaluation](#) is designed to fill this gap. A sample of learner responses to the course is shown to the [left](#). Measurement experts, clinician and doctoral student [Leslie Duran](#) and post-doctoral fellow [Dr. Skye Barbic](#) are two OTs who have facilitated this course.

Dr. Tamar Weiss visit to the UBC OSOT Department



From November 4-18 2015, the Department was pleased to welcome Dr. Patrice L. (Tamar) Weiss, PhD, OT, from Israel, who was visiting UBC with the support of the Peter Wall Institute for Advanced Studies. Dr. Tal Jarus, Professor, invited Dr. Weiss with funding from the International Visiting Research Scholar Program. Dr. Weiss directs the Laboratory for Innovations in Rehabilitation Technology (LIRT) in the Dept. of Occupational Therapy at the University of Haifa, where she and her team develop and evaluate novel virtual environments, haptic interfaces, co-located and online technologies to explore the effect of individual and collaborative rehabilitation.

While here, Dr. Weiss had an opportunity to meet with clinicians and researchers in the area of stroke, spinal cord injury, cerebral palsy, developmental coordination disorder, autism and head trauma. She visited the GF Strong Rehabilitation Centre, as well as the Sunny Hill Health Centre where she gave a series of presentations on her work. One highlight of her visit included a joint presentation with another visiting scholar, Dr. Emily Keshner Professor and Chair, Department of Physical Therapy, Temple University, Philadelphia. Both engaged in a lively debate/discussion on the use of virtual reality in rehabilitation and brain health. This, along with a public presentation to the UBC community on technologies to aid in social action and rehabilitation research, rounded out a very productive and collaborative visit.

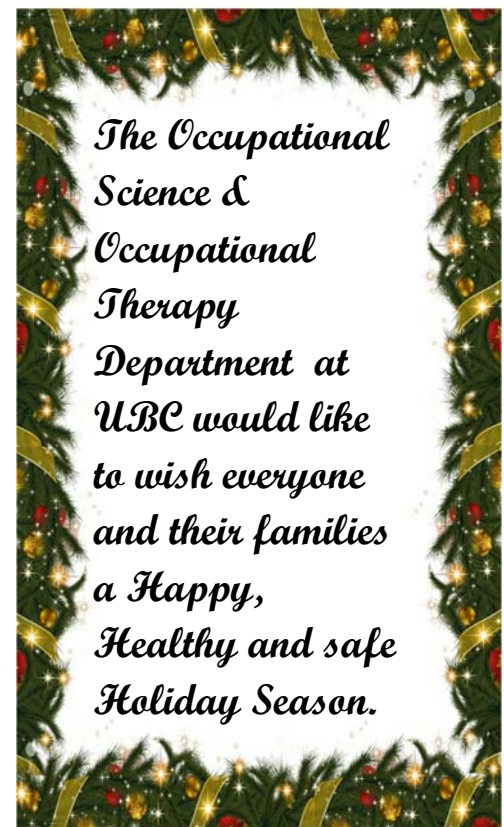
Dr. Susan Forwell Recipient of the 2016 Townsend & Polatajko Lectureship

Congratulations to Dr. Susan Forwell on being named the recipient of the prestigious 2016 Townsend & Polatajko Lectureship from the Canadian Society of Occupational Scientists (CSOS). The Townsend & Polatajko Lectureship is named in honour of Drs. Elizabeth Townsend and Helene Polatajko, the founders of CSOS, and their efforts to promote and foster occupational science in Canada. It is awarded every 2 years to a person who has made similar contributions to occupational science in Canada.

Dr. Forwell serves as sub-editor for the *Journal of Occupational Science*, and was a guest editor for a special issue. She served on the board of CSOS from 2005-2006, and has also served on and currently chairs the board of the International Society of Occupational Scientists.

Sue will deliver her lecture during the 2016 Joint International Conference in Portland, Maine, co-hosted by CSOS and the Society for the Study of Occupation: USA. The conference will run from September 29 to October 1, 2016.
