This July we are offering an inspirational and unique continuing educational opportunity with two European scholars, **Dr. Salvador Simó Algado** and **Dr. Maria Kapanadz**, both OTs with international profiles in social justice issues. The two-day workshop will offer an opportunity to hear from and participate with these presenters, as well as **Dr. Skye Barbic**, on **eco-social practice in occupational therapy**. It truly is an opportunity not to be missed.

**Dr. Melinda Suto** retired on December 31, 2016 after more than 27 years of distinguished service to the Department. A highly regarded educator from day one, particularly in psychosocial rehabilitation and qualitative research methods, Melinda received the prestigious UBC Killam Teaching Excellence Award in 2008. She provided outstanding guidance as a graduate supervisor to MOT, MSc, and PhD students. As a dedicated researcher, her work focused on recovery from mental illness, most recently as principal investigator for a collaborative, community-based project on community gardening, which you can read more about below.

With CAOT-BC, OSOT is actively participating in lobbying the provincial government to increase the number of students in the UBC Master of Occupational Therapy program. There are two and a half times the number of OT jobs as there are students graduating. With the UBC program being the smallest English-speaking program in Canada, it no longer meets the health needs of British Columbians. The time is now: the province must have more student OTs to meet the province's growing demands.

Advanced Community-based Occupational Therapy: New Perspectives for Practice & Research An Eco-Social Practice Workshop



Friday, July 14, 2017 & Saturday, July 15, 2017

Join our international visiting scholars, **Salvador Simó Algado** and **Maria Kapanadze**, and local faculty **Skye Barbic**, in a two-day intensive continuing professional development opportunity at UBC with a global focus on community-based practice with diverse populations.

This workshop presents an eco-social perspective to guide intervention and research. The creation of healthy, inclusive, and sustainable communities requires in-depth understanding of contemporary social challenges such as ecological and economic crises, long-term unemployment, poverty, and forced displacement. Vivid international examples of project development are offered, and participants are encouraged to apply knowledge gained from a step-by-step design process to their own professional practice. Content is applicable to Canadian and global contexts. Theoretical content is complemented with project-based learning, group dynamics, videos, and case studies.

The course will appeal to occupational therapists working in **psychosocial rehabilitation**, global health, **social services**, and with vulnerable populations marginalized by economic, employment, geographical, and other disparities. However, it is not limited to occupational therapists and everyone is welcome to register.

Catherine Backman will bring her internationally-recognized excellence in arthritis research to the University of Southampton for a three-year collaboration on research and education. To be eligible, fellows must be from a university ranked among the top 50 in the world.

While serving as a Southampton Diamond Jubilee Visiting Fellow, Dr. Backman will strengthen the networks between Canadian and British research initiatives, like Arthritis Research Canada and the Arthritis Research UK Centres of Excellence for Musculoskeletal Health and Work, and for Sport, Exercise and Osteoarthritis. ## PhD Student Stephanie Glegg Wins CCHCSP Career Enhancement Award

Congratulations to Stephanie Glegg (BScOT, 2004), who recently received the Canadian Child Health Clinician Scientist Program (CCHCSP)'s Career Enhancement Award in support of her PhD research. Stephanie's project, titled **"Using Social Network Analysis to Advance Knowledge Translation in Pediatric Rehabilitation,"** draws on her training in the UBC Occupational Therapy program, as well as her ten years of experience as an occupational therapist.



Co-supervised by Dr. Liisa Holsti (UBC OSOT) and Dr. Anita Kothari (Western University), Stephanie will study the social relationships and networks between researchers and healthcare providers in children's rehabilitation, in order to understand the best ways to support the implementation of cutting-edge scientific research into clinical practice.

## PhD Student Laura Bulk wins 3M Student Fellowship

## 2016 OSOT Research Initiative Fund (RIF)

UBC OSOT's newest faculty member, Skye Barbic, has won the 2016 OSOT Research Initiative Fund award for her study, **"Testing the Effectiveness of an Intervention to Facilitate Employment and Training for Young Adults Living with Mental Illness."** This study will assess the effectiveness of the Youth Breakthrough to Employment And Training (Y-BEAT) employment program, which supports youth with mental health challenges to build the confidence, skills and experience needed to kick-start their careers.

This research has the potential to produce a **well-tested**, **widely applicable psychosocial rehabilitation intervention for young adults with mental illness** and improve the standard of care for young adults who experience mental illness in Canada and beyond. <u>Click to learn more about Y-BEAT</u> or <u>watch a</u> <u>related PsyRehab.ca webinar</u>.

#### Highlighting RHSC 505: Measurement for Assessment, Planning and Evaluation

A core course in the online program is <u>RHSC 505</u>: <u>Measurement for Assessment</u>, <u>Planning and Evaluation</u>. Recently redesigned by OSOT Assistant Professor **Dr. Skye Barbic**, a health outcomes research expert, this course helps learners to better understand the assessments they use regularly and to reimagine their assessment practices and possibilities.
